



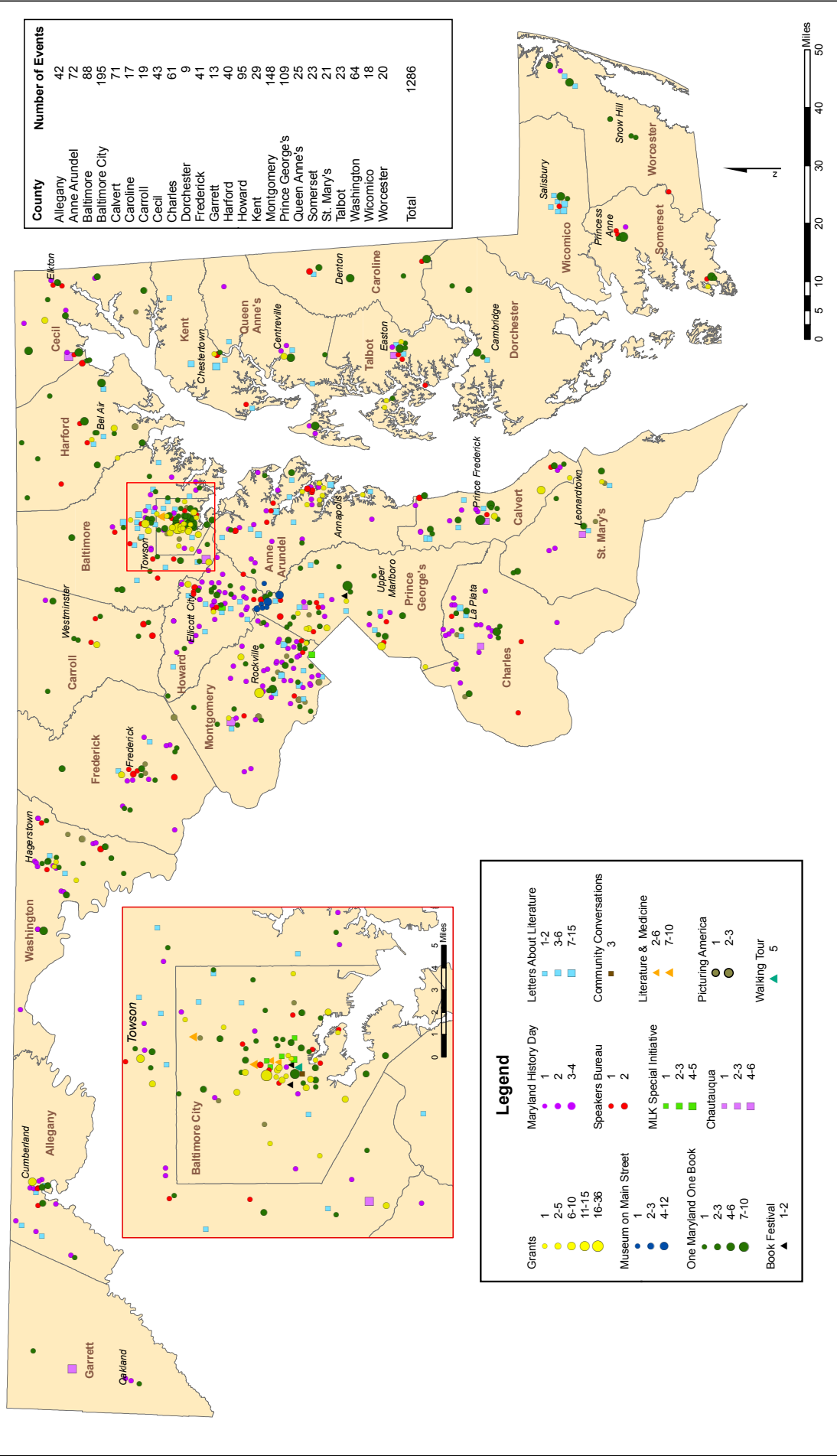

Thank you for all you do to keep the humanities thriving in Maryland! We hope you will continue to join us in opening eyes, opening ears, and opening minds.



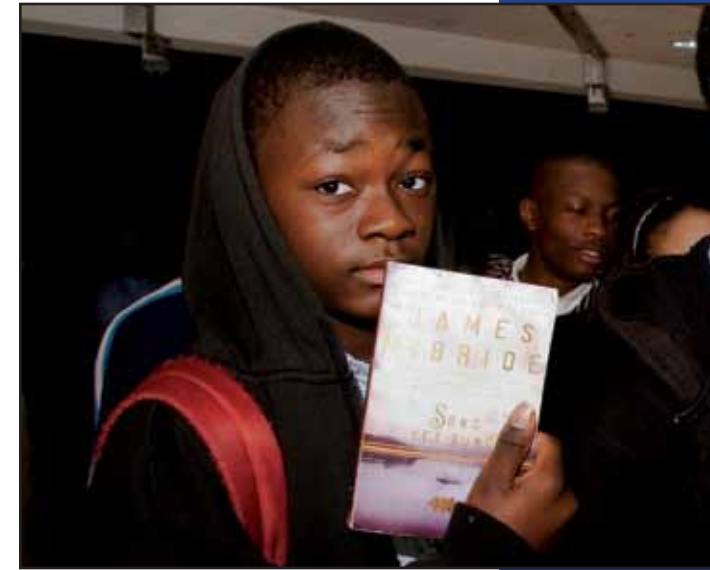
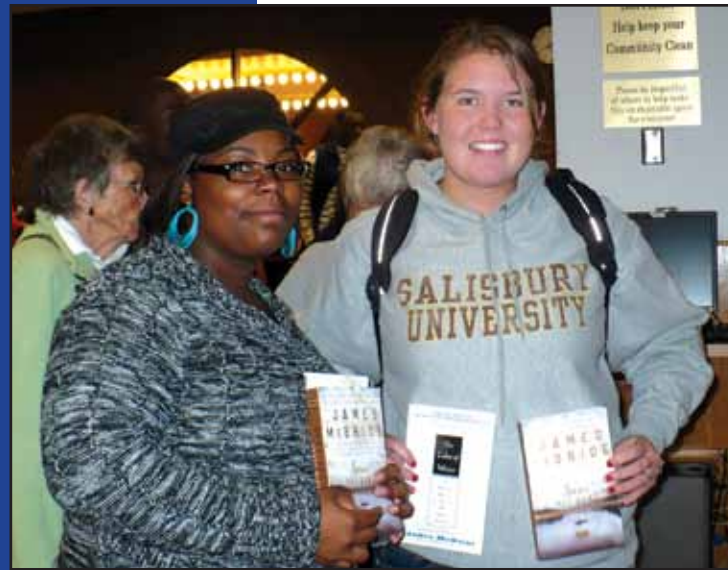

With programs like Maryland History Day, Letters About Literature, One Maryland One Book, and Chautauqua, we complement dwindling school resources in social studies and libraries. Participation fosters an appreciation of history, research, literature, and reading with lasting impacts on academic achievement and quality of life.



DID YOU KNOW...?

In 2009 and 2010, more than 3,000 books—as well as reader’s and teacher’s curriculum guides—were provided to Maryland high schools for instruction through **One Maryland One Book**.



DID YOU KNOW...?

Scores of kids enjoy the **Chautauqua** living history series each summer with their families, engaging them with history, performance, and legendary historical figures while providing a one-of-a-kind, out-of-classroom learning opportunity.



DID YOU KNOW...?
In 2010, more than 1,800 elementary, middle, and high school students participated in **Letters About Literature**. Many young letter writers hear directly from their inspiring authors, cementing their love of reading and spurring their own literary efforts.



DID YOU KNOW...?
More than 18,000 middle and high school students participated in **Maryland History Day 2010**. Students devoted, on average, 80+ hours to their research projects, working individually and in groups to craft essays, exhibits, websites, documentary videos, and live performances.



Given its modest size, Maryland is an amazingly diverse state—geographically, economically, ethnically. MHC partners with local organizations in dozens of communities to present more than 600 free events a year. **Your support helps bring humanities programming to towns large and small, exploring our differences and honoring our commonalities.**



DID YOU KNOW...? The 2010 **One Maryland One Book** selection, Warren St. John's *Outcasts United*, explored how a traditional American town deals with a crisis of identity and values. When a Syrian woman begins coaching soccer for three teams of refugee boys, the small Georgia hamlet of Clarkston struggles to make the newcomers welcome.



DID YOU KNOW...? Small communities experience the immense resources of the Smithsonian Institution through **Museum on Main Street**, a collection of mobile interactive exhibitions focusing on America's social history. In late 2010, "Between Fences" offered an exploration of the literal and figurative roles of the fence in our nation's history, as a creator of both boundaries and community.

DID YOU KNOW...? More than 2,000 free copies of our **One Maryland One Book** titles were provided to libraries throughout Maryland.



DID YOU KNOW...? The 2009 **One Maryland One Book** selection, James McBride's *Song Yet Sung*, provided a riveting examination of community, ethics, and race relations through the prism of the slave trade on Maryland's Eastern Shore.



DID YOU KNOW...? **Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.: Remembrance and Reconciliation**—MHC's multi-year, special initiative—examined how issues of race continue to affect Marylanders' daily lives. The Federation of State Humanities Councils honored this ambitious program with the 2008 Helen and Martin Schwartz Prize for outstanding public humanities programming.

When we consider the humanities—history, literature, philosophy, ethics, jurisprudence, archaeology, genealogy, etc.—we begin to comprehend the great complexities and great responsibilities of being a citizen in a vital democracy.

Your support allows us to offer programs that go well beyond the surface, identifying and challenging what it means to be an engaged member of a community.



DID YOU KNOW...? Veteran artist-scholars spend years researching the lives of historic figures from American history, and **Chautauqua** brings a trio of them to six sites in Maryland every summer. Gaining insights into the lives of legendary women and men, rapt audiences see, hear, and discover the events that shaped the American experience.



DID YOU KNOW...? From conference-style lectures to living history performances to interactive discussions, **Speakers Bureau** brings expert scholars and compelling topics to libraries, community and senior centers, clubs, cultural organizations, and civic groups in every corner of Maryland.

DID YOU KNOW...? Marylanders met Woody Guthrie, Jackie Robinson, and Eleanor Roosevelt in 2009 for “Rights and Reformers” and went “Beyond Boundaries” in 2010 with Thurgood Marshall, Frederick Law Olmsted, and Sacagawea at **Chautauqua**.



DID YOU KNOW...? **Speakers Bureau** currently features a roster of nearly 100 presentations on a diverse slate of topics, including: the Great Baltimore Fire of 1904; Black women, food, and power; Robert E. Lee’s Campaign of 1862; the “almighty oyster”; and the Mason-Dixon Line.



DID YOU KNOW...? Healthcare is one of the most debated issues of recent years. Everyone wants access to top-quality care. How do healthcare providers handle the challenges and stress of their profession? **Literature & Medicine** brings colleagues from all areas of a hospital together in discussion around a text that informs the patient-care experience.

In addition to being Maryland's primary producer of public humanities programs, MHC acts as a pivotal stabilizing force for partners with modest resources. **Your support allows us to share our expertise, reach, and financial support with small local community organizations.**



DID YOU KNOW...?
Our **Grants** program allows us to foster and nurture innovative humanities programming anywhere it occurs, with awards ranging from \$1,200 to \$10,000. Grantees typically leverage MHC's support three to one.



DID YOU KNOW...?
In 2009 and 2010, MHC awarded forty-one **grants** totaling \$195,398, which were leveraged to raise an additional \$874,187 in project funding.

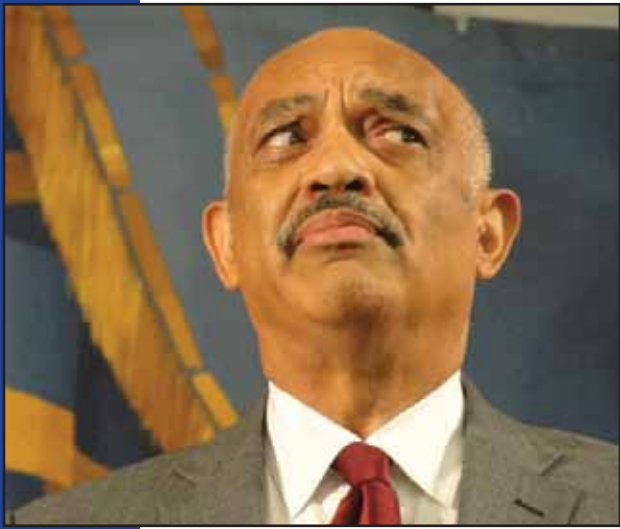
